President's Report

As December arrives, I want to take a few moments to look back over the past year, and forward to the new one. 2022 has seen a number of milestones.

We returned to public outreach with the State Wide Star Party, the monthly public observing sessions at Carolina Beach State Park, and International Observe the Moon Night. We did a number of "semi-public" events, for example at the Fort Fisher NC National Guard youth event, and with the Wallace Girl Scout troop.

In addition to reaching out to the public, we added some new services for club members. A significant achievement of the club is the completion of the New Astronomer's package, providing items and information to help members who consider themselves New Astronomers to learn and grow in the hobby. We've created Special Interest Groups for members interested in particular aspects of astronomy. We've continued the "hybrid" monthly meetings, "simulcasting" via Zoom in addition to resuming in-person at the campus of UNCW.

Perhaps the single most important achievement for members who observe deep-sky objects is the establishment of the club observatory under 6th magnitude skies at Starfields. There's already room for 12 observers to bring their own equipment. The observatory is also being developed with a long-term plan for permanent on-site club scopes in observatory buildings, including an equatorially mounted driven scope suitable for imaging, and a large (14" or bigger) Dobsonian reflector to make the fainter fuzzies more observable. Other club equipment is stored in a shed, including 8" and 10" Dobsonians.

The pier for the equatorial scope has been installed, and we observed the moon, Jupiter, Saturn, and Alberio using it. Currently a wedge is permanently installed, while a C8 OTA and fork mount are installed for observing and removed for storage in the shed. We will soon have the whole telescope permanently mounted with a weather-proof cover.

I'm looking forward to seeing the club and the services it provides to its members continue to grow over the next year. It will do so under new leadership: Ben Steelman is running (currently unopposed) for President, while I'll be taking over the AVP and reaching out to people to give presentations at the monthly meetings.

I do want to take the opportunity of this last President's Message to thank people who've made some important contributions to the club:

- Outgoing VP Skip Hager, who has also worked on the observatory.
- Karl Adlon, who has not only served as Newsletter Editor, but did a solid term as AVP coordinating presentations, and contributed expertise and labor on scopes and infrastructure at the observatory. And that's not all, as he and Mary Jean will be hosting this year's Holiday Celebration.
- Hank Lyon, who in addition to being ALCOR, has been chairmen of the Observatory Committee, guiding and contributing to the development of the site.
- Buzz Tucker, who continues to build things for the club, including the outhouse, shed ramp and lean-to, and now is working on a new Dobsonian mount for the club's 10".
- Roger Blake, who has been central to the club's Outreach efforts.
- Tom Tucker, who sicced a Really Big Bushog on the thicket to the south of the observatory, and improved the southern horizon immensely.

Thanks to all of you, and to those who I don't have room to squeeze in here, for all you've given to the club.
