## March 25 Public Observing Report

Saturday was our first public observing session. The weather was (sort of) improving by the start of the session, at least to the extent that it wasn't solidly socked in.

I'd arrived at a bit after 6, which allowed me to set up the solar system before visitors arrived. When there were about 6 people present, I offered to start the solar system tour. By the time we reached Mercury about another 10 or so people had arrived. At the end of the tour, it looked like about 20 people were waiting for us to show them the, um. Is that glow in the haze the moon?

The transparency was almost non-existent, with the top layer of clouds at 100%. Through the scopes we could just make out the crescent shape, but only rarely were we able to see any hint of maria.

In spite of the poor skies, the visitors stuck around. We got questions about the scopes, and about future public sessions. Several people told us they'd been looking forward to the first session of the year. Others asked whether the State-Wide Star Party would replace the public session for April (turns out the answer is no, we have a public session the week after the SWSP).

Thanks to Steve for showing up in spite of the crummy forecast, and staying to help with the large number of people. One highlight of the evening was a visit from Rayleigh, who is a member of the Raleigh Astronomy Club, but is currently attending UNCW. I'm hoping they'll participate in our public activities while they're in residence down here.

Here's hoping for better weather at the SWSP (State Wide Star Party) and the April public session.
